#### Searching by keyword


Click **Edit** > **Advanced Search**. Enter the keyword (text) for information you want to find in the search window, and then click **Search**. Hits are displayed as a list. Click one of the displayed hits to jump to that page.



#### Jumping directly from bookmarks

Click a title to jump to that page. Click + or > to view the lower level titles in that section. To return to the previous page, perform the following operation on your keyboard.

- Windows: Hold down **Alt**, and then press ←.
- Mac OS: Hold down the command key, and then press  $\leftarrow$ .



#### Printing only the pages you need

You can extract and print only the pages you need. Click Print in the File menu, and then specify the pages you want to print in Pages in Pages to Print.

• To specify a series of pages, enter a hyphen between the start page and the end page. Example: 20-25

• To specify pages that are not in series, divide the pages with commas. Example: 5, 10, 15


# **Projector Parts and Functions**

Name		Function
0	Foot release lever	Press the foot release lever to extend and retract the front adjustable foot.
2	Air intake vent	Takes in air to cool the projector internally.
3	Mount plate fixing point	Attach the optional or supplied mount plate here.
4	Rear feet (Mount plate fixing points)	Loosen these feet by turning them counterclockwise, and then remove them to attach the optional or supplied mount plate.
5	Air filter cover	Open to access the air filter.
6	Front adjustable foot	When setup on a surface such as a desk, extend the foot to adjust the position of the image.



5	Esc button	Stops the current function. Moves back to the previous menu level while displaying the projector's menu.		
6	Volume up/down buttons - Volume +	Adjusts the volume for the speaker and headphones.



# **Projector Placement**


You can place the projector on almost any flat surface to project an image.

You can also install the projector on a mount if you want to use it in a fixed location. An optional or supplied mount plate is required when installing the projector on a commercially available tripod or on VESA compliant mounting hardware.

The projector can be installed at various angles. There is no vertical or horizontal limit to how the projector can be installed.



• Place the projector so it squarely faces the screen, not at an angle.






If you cannot install the projector squarely facing the screen, correct any resulting keystone distortion using the projector controls. For the best quality images, we recommend adjusting the installation position of the projector to achieve the correct image size and shape.

Note the following points when selecting a projector location:

• Place the projector on a sturdy, level surface or install it using a compatible mount.



• Leave plenty of space around and under the projector for ventilation, and do not place it on top of or next to anything that could block the vents.

## \rm Marning

- You must install a ceiling mount when suspending the projector from a ceiling. If you do not install the projector correctly, it could fall and cause damage or injury.
- Do not use adhesives on the mount plate fixing points to prevent the screws from loosening, or use lubricants, oils, or similar substances on the projector; the projector case may crack causing it to fall from its ceiling mount. This could cause serious injury to anyone under the ceiling mount and could damage the projector.
- Failure to install the mount plate, AC adapter holder, mounting hardware, and projector may cause the projector to fall. After installing the projector onto VESA compliant (75 × 75mm) mounting hardware using the optional or supplied mount plate (ELPMB65), make sure you secure the mounting hardware to all of the projector's mount plate fixing points. Also, secure the projector and the mounting hardware using wire that is strong enough to hold their weight.
- Do not install the projector in a location subject to high levels of dust or humidity, or in a location subject to smoke or steam. Otherwise, it could cause a fire or electric shock to occur. The projector's case could also deteriorate and be damaged causing the projector to fall from the mount.

# Examples of environments that could cause the projector to fall due to case deterioration

- Locations subject to excessive smoke or airborne oil particles, such as factories or kitchens
- Locations containing volatile solvents or chemicals, such as factories or laboratories
- Locations where the projector could be subjected to detergents or chemicals, such as factories or kitchens
- · Locations in which aroma oils are often used, such as relaxation rooms
- Near devices that produce excessive smoke, airborne oil particles, or foam at events

## **M** Warning

- Do not cover the projector's air intake or air exhaust vents. If the vents are covered, the internal temperature could rise and cause a fire.
- Do not use or store the projector in locations where it will be subject to dust or dirt. Otherwise, the quality of the projected image may decline, or the air filter may become clogged, resulting in a malfunction or fire.
- Do not install the projector on an unstable surface or in a location beyond the weight specifications of the projector. Otherwise, it could fall or topple causing an accident and injury.
- When installing the projector in a high position, take measures to prevent falling by using wires to ensure safety in an emergency, such as an earthquake, and to prevent accidents. If it is not installed correctly, it could fall causing an accident and injury.
- Do not install in locations where salt damage could occur, or in locations subject to corrosive gas such as sulphuric gas from hot springs. Otherwise, corrosion could cause the projector to fall. It could also cause the projector to malfunction.



## **A** Caution

Do not cover the projector's lens. If the lens is covered, the internal temperature could rise and it could result in a malfunction.

#### Attention

- We recommend installing the projector on a protective mat to prevent the projector or the cloth covering the speaker from being damaged, or the color from staining unprotected surfaces.
- The sound from the projector's speaker may be muffled.


### **Precautions on Installation**

Note the following precautions when installing the projector.

Be sure to leave the following amount of space around the projector so as not to block the air exhaust and intake vents.

## \rm **Caution**

Install the supplied AC adapter more than 30 cm away from the projector. If the temperature of the AC adapter rises due to heat from the projector, the projector may not operate properly.


## **Projection Distance**

The distance at which you place the projector from the screen determines the approximate size of the image. The image size increases the farther the projector is from the screen, but can vary depending on the aspect ratio and other settings.

See the Appendix for details about how far to place the projector from the screen based on the size of the projected image.



When correcting keystone distortion, your image is slightly smaller.

# Installing the Projector on VESA Compliant Mounting Hardware or a Tripod

You can install the projector onto VESA compliant mounting hardware or a tripod using the optional or supplied mount plate (ELPMB65).



- You can install the projector on VESA compliant (75  $\times$  75mm) mounting hardware.
- You can install the projector on a tripod for which 1/4-20UNC size fixed screws can be used.
- When installing the projector in a high place, be sure to install the optional security wire set (ELPWR01) for safety purposes.



Turn the projector upside down.




Loosen the rear feet by turning them counterclockwise, and then remove them.


When installing the projector in a high place, thread the optional security wire set (ELPWR01) through the mount plate.



# **Projector Placement**



Attach the mount plate to the projector and secure it in place with the screws that come with the mount plate.



## **A** Caution

Do not use the rear feet that you removed in step 2 to fix the mount plate. They could loosen and cause the projector to fall.

Install the projector onto VESA compliant mounting hardware or a tripod. For details, see the documentation supplied with the mounting hardware or tripod.

## **A** Caution


When installing the projector on the tripod, make sure you securely fix the tripod's screws. If you place the projector upside down, the screws could loosen and cause the projector to fall from the tripod.



When installing the projector in a high place such as a ceiling, make sure you hook the carabiner of the optional security wire set (ELPWR01) to a point that is strong enough to hold the weight of the projector and the mounting hardware.



If necessary, fix the AC adapter onto the wall or ceiling using the AC adapter holder that comes with the mount plate.





When fixing the AC adapter on the wall or ceiling, use screws suitable for the material of the wall or ceiling.

#### Attention

Check the shape and orientation of the connectors on any cable you plan to connect. Do not force a connector into a port if it does not fit. The device or your projector could be damaged or could malfunction.

## **Connecting to Video Sources**

If your video source has an HDMI port, you can connect it to the projector using an HDMI cable and send the image source's audio with the projected image.

#### Attention

Do not turn on the video source before connecting it to the projector. Doing so could damage the projector.




- If the port on the device you connect has an unusual shape, use the cable supplied with the device or an optional cable to connect to the projector.
- Some video equipment is capable of outputting different types of signals. See your video equipment manual to confirm what type of signals can be output.



Connect the HDMI cable to your video source's HDMI output port.



Connect the other end to the projector's HDMI port.



## **Connecting Headphones**


You can connect headphones to the projector's Audio Out port. You can control the volume using the projector's remote control.

#### Attention

The projector's Audio Out port only supports 3-pin headphones. If you use any other headphones, audio may not be output normally.



Connect the stereo headphone's mini-jack cable to the projector's Audio Out port.



## **A** Caution

Do not start a playback at a high volume setting. Sudden loud noises may cause hearing loss.

Always lower the volume before powering off, so that you can power on and then gradually increase the volume.

## Connecting to an ARC Compatible AV System


If your AV system has an HDMI port, you can connect it to the projector using an HDMI cable (ARC compatible) to output audio to the AV system.



Connect the HDMI cable to your video source's HDMI input port (ARC compatible).

Connect the other end to the projector's HDMI2 (ARC) port.



• To output audio from the projector's HDMI2 (ARC) port, set **HDMI2 ARC** to **On** and **Sound Output Device** to **ARC** in the projector's menu.

Settings > HDMI CEC > CEC Control > HDMI2 ARC

- Sound > Sound Output Device
- If you want to output higher quality audio, set **Sound Output Format** as **Auto** in the projector's **Sound** menu.


The remote control uses the two AAA batteries that came with the projector.

Attention

Make sure you read the Safety Instructions before handling the batteries.



Remove the battery cover as shown.






Remove the old batteries, if necessary.



Dispose of used batteries according to local regulations.



Insert the batteries with the + and – ends facing as shown.




## **A** Warning

Check the positions of the (+) and (-) marks inside the battery holder to ensure the batteries are inserted the correct way. If the batteries are not used correctly, they could explode or leak causing a fire, injury, or damage to the product.



Replace the battery cover and press it down until it clicks into place.





## **Remote Control Operation**

The remote control lets you control the projector from almost anywhere in the room.

It is recommended that you aim the remote control at the projector's receivers within the distance and angles listed here.





Avoid using the remote control in conditions with bright fluorescent lights or in direct sunlight, or the projector may not respond to commands. If you are not going to use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries. When you turn on the projector for the first time, you need to set up the built-in Android  $\mathrm{TV}^{\text{-}}$  .



You can change each of the settings even after completing the initial setup. Change the settings in the menu displayed when you press at the top right of the Android TV<sup>-</sup> home screen.

Turn on the projector.

When the paring screen is displayed, hold down the [Enter] button and button on the remote control at the same time to pair the remote control and the projector.



When pairing starts, the indicator on the remote control flashes. When pairing is complete, the indicator turns off. 3

When the language selection screen is displayed, select the language you want to use.

- When the Wi-Fi setting screen is displayed, select the wireless network you want to use, and then follow the on-screen instructions to make necessary settings.

When the login screen is displayed, sign in using your Google account.




## Android TV<sup>™</sup> Home Screen

When you turn on the projector or press the button on the remote control, the Android TV<sup>°</sup> home screen is displayed.

You can easily access online content, applications, and projector settings from the home screen.



- Displays the **Settings** menu of the Android TV<sup>\*</sup>. You can select various settings such as Wi-Fi setting, language setting, and Google account information.
- ② Displays a list of available input sources.
- Oisplays the applications downloaded on the Android TV<sup>\*</sup>. You can add applications to this list by selecting the + icon.
- Displays the online content recommended by the applications.

## **Turning On the Projector**

When you connect the video equipment to the projector, turn on the video equipment you want to use after you turn on the projector.




Connect the AC adapter to the projector's AC adapter port.



Connect the power cord to the AC adapter.



Plug the power cord into an electrical outlet.



The projector enters standby mode. This indicates that the projector is receiving power, but is not yet turned on.

Press the power button on the control panel or remote control to turn on the projector.

The status indicator flashes blue as the projector warms up. Once the projector is warmed up, the status indicator stops flashing and turns blue.

The first time you turn on the projector, the remote control pairing screen and initial setup screen are displayed. Follow the on-screen instructions to complete the settings.

## \Lambda Warning

- Never look into the projector lens when the light source is on. This can damage your eyes and is especially dangerous for children.
- When turning on the projector at a distance using the remote control, make sure there is no one looking into the lens.
- During projection, do not block the light from the projector with a book or other objects. If the light from the projector is blocked, the area on which the light shines becomes hot which could cause it to melt, burn, or start a fire. Also, the lens may get hot due to the reflected light which could cause the projector to malfunction. To stop projection, turn off the projector.

## **AC Adapter Safety Instructions**

Follow these safety instructions when using the supplied AC adapter.

## \Lambda Warning

- Under the following conditions, unplug the projector from the outlet and refer all repairs to qualified service personnel. Continuing to use under these conditions may result in fire or electric shock.
  - If smoke comes from the AC adapter.
  - If strange odors or strange noises come from the AC adapter.
  - If the AC adapter has been damaged.
  - If liquid or foreign objects get inside the AC adapter.

## **Turning On the Projector**

## **A** Warning

- Incorrect use of the AC adapter may cause malfunction, fire, or electric shock. Take the following precautions when using the AC adapter.
- Do not use any AC adapter other than the one supplied with the projector.
- The supplied AC adapter is designed specifically for this projector model. Do not use it with any other models.
- Do not apply strong pressure or shocks to the AC adapter.
- Do not hold the AC adapter with wet hands.
- Do not install the AC adapter in a narrow space and do not cover it with cloth.
- Do not touch the AC adapter for a long time while it is energized. It may cause a low-temperature burn.
- Do not spray flammable gas such as insecticide on the AC adapter.
- Do not put the AC adapter in a high-pressure container or a cooking appliance such as a microwave oven.
- Do not place the AC adapter near the projector's air exhaust vent.
- Do not wind the power cord around the AC adapter.

## **Turning Off the Projector**

Turn off the projector after use.



• Turn off this product when it is not in use to prolong the life of the projector. Light source life varies depending on the environmental conditions and usage. Brightness decreases over time.



Press the power button on the control panel or remote control. The light source turns off, and the status indicator turns off.



To transport or store the projector, make sure the status indicator on the projector is off, and then unplug the power cord.



• You can keep supplying power to the projector by selecting **Suspend** as **Power Button Setting**. This lets the projector start earlier when you turn it on.

• When **Power Button Setting** is set to **Suspend**, you can turn on the projector by pressing any button on the control panel or remote control.

## **Projection Modes**

Depending on how you positioned the projector, you may need to change the projection mode so your images project correctly.

- Standard lets you project from a table in front of the screen.
- **Upside Down** flips the image over top-to-bottom to project upside-down from a ceiling or wall mount.

## **Changing the Projection Mode Using the Menus**

You can change the projection mode to flip the image over top-to-bottom using the projector menus.




Turn on the projector and display an image.



Press the (@) button on the remote control.



Select the **Display** menu and press the [Enter] button.





Select **Projection** and press [Enter].

Select a projection mode and press [Enter].

## Adjusting the Image Height

If you are projecting from a table or other flat surface and the image is too high or low, you can adjust the image height using the projector's adjustable foot.


The larger the angle of tilt, the harder it becomes to focus. Locate the projector so that it only needs to be tilted at a small angle.



Turn on the projector and display an image.

Press the foot release lever to extend and retract the front adjustable foot.



The foot extends from the projector.

You can adjust the position up to 9 degrees.

Release the lever to lock the foot.

If the projected image is unevenly rectangular, you need to adjust the image shape.

You can project an even, rectangular image by placing the projector directly in front of the center of the screen and keeping it level. If you place the projector at an angle to the screen, or tilt it up or down, or off to the side, you may need to correct the image shape.

After correction, your image is slightly smaller.

For the best quality images, we recommend adjusting the installation position of the projector to achieve the correct image size and shape.

## **Correcting the Image Shape and Focus Automatically**

When you press the button on the remote control or when the projector is moved or tilted, **Auto Keystone** automatically corrects focus and any keystone distortion of the projected image.

Auto Keystone operates under the following conditions:


- Screen size is 100 inches or less.
- Projection distance is about 0.7 to 2.2 m.
- Auto Keystone is set to On in the projector's Display menu.
- Projection is set to Standard in the projector's Display menu.
- Auto Keystone operates even if the projection size exceeds 100 inches. However, the adjustment may fail depending on the installation angle of the projector, the brightness of the room, and the material of the projection surface. As necessary, adjust the keystone distortion and focus setting manually using the projector menu.
  - If you set **Auto Keystone** to **Off**, pressing the <sup>(C)</sup> button on the remote control only adjusts the focus automatically.

## **Correcting the Image Shape Manually**

You can correct the shape of an image that is unevenly rectangular by using the projector's **Display** menu.



- You cannot combine H/V-Keystone correction with other image shape correction methods.
  - You can correct vertical keystone distortion up to 34° up or down.
- You can correct horizontal keystone distortion up to  $40^{\rm o}$  right or left.

# Selecting an Image Source

When multiple image sources are connected to the projector, such as a computer and DVD player, you can switch from one image source to the other.



Make sure the connected image source you want to use is turned on.



For video image sources, insert a DVD or other video media and press play.



Press the = button on the remote control.



Press the up or down arrow button to select the image source you want.



When no image signal is detected, check the cable connections between the projector and the image source.

## **Image Aspect Ratio**

The projector can display images in different width-to-height ratios called aspect ratios. Normally, the input signal from your video source determines the image's aspect ratio. However, you can change the aspect ratio for certain images to fit your screen.

If you always want to use a particular aspect ratio for a certain video input source, you can select it using the projector's **Picture** menu.







# **Controlling the Volume with the Volume Buttons**

## **A** Warning

Do not use the device near any medical equipment or equipment that is automatically controlled, such as automatic doors or fire alarms. Electromagnetic interference from the device may cause such equipment to malfunction and cause an accident.




- You may not be able to connect depending on the standard and type of device.
- Even when connecting within the specified communication distance, connections can be lost due to the status of the signal.
- The communication method for Bluetooth uses the same frequency (2.4 GHz) as wireless LAN (IEEE802.11b/g/n) or microwave ovens. Therefore, if these devices are used at the same time, radio wave interference may occur, the audio may be interrupted, or communication may not be possible. If you do need to use these devices at the same time, make sure there is enough distance between them and the Bluetooth device.

When you want to enjoy the sound only from the projector, you can temporarily turn off the projected image.



Press the button on the control panel or remote control. The light source turns off and the projected image is interrupted.



## **HDMI CEC Features**

When an audio/video source that meets the HDMI CEC standard is connected to the projector's HDMI port, you can use the projector's remote control to control certain features of the linked device.

# **Projector Maintenance**

You may need to clean the projector's lens periodically, and clean the air filter and air vents to prevent the projector from overheating due to blocked ventilation.

The only parts you should replace are the air filter and remote control batteries. If any other part needs replacing, contact Epson or an authorized Epson servicer.

## ▲ Warning

Before cleaning any part of the projector, turn it off and unplug the power cord. Never open any cover on the projector, except as specifically explained in this manual. Dangerous electrical voltages in the projector can injure you severely.

# **Cleaning the Lens**

Clean the projector's lens periodically, or whenever you notice dust or smudges on the surface.

- To remove dust or smudges, gently wipe the lens with lens-cleaning paper.
- To remove stubborn smudges, moisten a soft, lint-free cloth with lens cleaner and gently wipe the lens. Do not spray any liquid directly on the lens.

## **A** Warning

Do not use a lens cleaner that contains flammable gas. The high heat generated by the projector may cause a fire.

#### Attention

Do not use glass cleaner or any harsh materials to clean the lens and do not subject the lens to any impacts; otherwise, it could be damaged. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue.

# **Cleaning the Projector Case**

Before cleaning the projector case, turn off the projector and unplug the power cord.

- To remove dust or dirt, use a soft, dry, lint-free cloth.
- To remove stubborn dirt, use a soft cloth moistened with water and mild soap. Do not spray liquid directly on the projector.

#### Attention

Do not use wax, alcohol, benzene, paint thinner, or other chemicals to clean the projector case. These can damage the case. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue.

Regular filter maintenance is important to maintain your projector. Clean the air filter when a message appears telling you the temperature inside the projector has reached a high level. It is recommended that you clean these parts over a 5,000 hour period. Clean them more often than this if you use the projector in a environment that is dustier than expected. (Assuming the projector is used in an atmosphere in which airborne particulate matter is less than 0.04 to 0.2 mg/m3.)

#### Attention

If regular maintenance is not performed, your Epson projector will notify you when the temperature inside the projector has reached a high level. Do not wait until this warning appears to maintain your projector filter as prolonged exposure to high temperatures may reduce the life of your projector.

## **Cleaning the Air Filter and Vents**


Clean the projector's air filter or vents if they get dusty, or if you see a message telling you to clean them.



Turn off the projector and unplug the power cord.

Gently remove the dust using a small vacuum designed for computers or a very soft brush (such as a paintbrush).





You can remove the air filter so that you can clean both sides. Do not rinse the air filter in water, or use any detergent or solvent to clean it.

#### Attention

Do not use canned air. The gases may leave a flammable residue or push dust and debris into the projector's optics or other sensitive areas.



If dust is difficult to remove or the air filter is damaged, replace the air filter.

## **Replacing the Air Filter**

You need to replace the air filter in the following situations:

• The air filter is torn or damaged.







# **Projection Problems**

If the projector is not working properly, turn it off, unplug it, and then plug it back in and turn it on.

If this does not solve the problem, check the following:


- The indicators on the projector may indicate the problem.
- The solutions in this manual can help you solve many problems.

If none of these solutions help, contact Epson for technical support.

After repairing the projector, Epson may return the projector to you in its initial status. Make sure you make a note of the account information of each online service before you contact your local dealer or the nearest Epson repair center. The indicators on the projector indicate the projector status and let you know when a problem occurs. Check the status and color of the indicators and then refer to this table for a solution.



If the indicators display a pattern not listed in the table below, turn the projector off, unplug it, and contact Epson for help.

### **Solving Projector Shutdown Problems**

If the projector's light source turns off unexpectedly, try the following steps until the problem is solved.



The projectors may have entered sleep mode after the interval of time specified in **Sleep Timer** in the projector's **Settings** menu has passed. Press the power button on the control panel or remote control to wake the projector.



After waking the projector, **Sleep Timer** is automatically set to **Off**.



When the status indicator is lit orange, the projector has overheated and turned off.



The cooling fans may run in standby status depending on the projector settings. Also, when the projector wakes from standby status, the fans may cause an unexpected noise. This is not a malfunction.

If no image is displayed, try the following steps until the problem is solved.

- Check the status indicator to confirm that the projector is in normal operating status.
- Press the projector's power button to wake it from standby or sleep mode.

### Check the following items:

## Adjusting a Fuzzy or Blurry Image

- Position the projector so the keystone adjustment angle is not so wide that it distorts the image.



Clean the projector's lens.



To avoid condensation on the lens after bringing the projector in from a cold environment, let the projector warm up to room temperature before using it.



Adjust the **Sharpness** setting in the projector's **Picture** menu to improve image quality.

If you are projecting from a computer, use a lower resolution or select a resolution that matches the projector's native resolution.
